## 1.2 Course Description:

An introduction to the theory and scientific methods of psychological assessment for the purposes of personnel selection, with an emphasis on the most current and valid selection procedures. Related topics include job analysis and competency modeling, recruitment, decision-making, legal and ethical issues.

Anti-requisite(s): 3 lecture hours, 0.5 course

Pre-requisite(s): Enrollment in 3rd or 4th year of BMOS

The purpose of these articles is to provide students with the opportunity to read, understand and appreciate scholarly research papers. All course resources will be posted prior to the start of each class (i.e. power points, readings, etc.).

# 3. Course Objectives and Format

The DAN Department of Management and Organizational Studies as a whole draws upon an evidence-based management approach. Evidence-based management is the systematic process of gathering evidence from multiple sources, critically appraising the evidence, and using that evidence in making and evaluating management decisions to improve organizational performance.

## 3.1 Course Objectives

This course provides a systematic examination of choices that confront managers in Canada who wish to implement effective human resource recruitment and selection strategies and activities. These choices are presented through introduction to the concepts within the human resources management context as well as the organizational context.

#### 3.2 Course Format

This course will involve online lectures, discussions, case studies, class exercises and video presentations. It is expected that students will have completed the assigned readings and other preparation prior to class so that they can actively participate in class discussions. At the same time, not all material covered in the readings will be discussed in lecture.

# 4. Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of MOS 3384B students will be able to:

- Describe the role and activities of human resources management in facilitating the steps required
  for recruitment and selection of human resources in organizations. This includes an evidence based approach to formulating decisions, recommending plans of action that effectively link such
  HR policies to business objectives to improve performance, and measuring the impact of human
  resources management.
- 2. Define, describe, compare, and contrast key terms, theories, concepts, approaches, models and tools relevant to the human resource recruitment and selection process across workplaces.
- 3. Synthesize and critically assess the extent to which various recruitment and selection practices and associated activities (such as job and competency analysis, performance measurement, recruitment methods, applicant screening, testing and other assessments, and decision making) are based on professional standards of reliability and validity, and implemented in an effective and ethical manner.
- 4. Recognize how legislation, technology, changing economic conditions, labour force dynamics and other external factors influence personnel recruitment and selection practices.

#### 5. Evaluation

#### 5.1 Examinations:

The final exam will consist of an integrated case with long questions in format. The final exam will be scheduled for completion during a one week period online, is cumulative, and open book. Students are responsible for material covered in the lectures as well as the assigned chapters and sections in the text. The final exam will be scheduled during the exam period.

#### 5.2 Individual Course Participation:

Participation is an important component of this course and includes regular attendance in class as well as participation in any exercises, games, case studies, simulations, and discussions that occur. You are expected to stay current with your readings so that you are prepared to ask questions, provide ideas and generally contribute to the learning community on an ongoing basis. See the Instructor standards for class participation for greater detail on how participation will be marked. This will be posted on OWL. You are expected to manage this aspect of your own learning style in order to meet course requirements. There are no makeups for missed in class participation.

### 5.3 Term Project Presentation:

Each student will be required to prepare a comprehensive seminar on an evidence-based Personnel and Recruitment case. Instructions will be provided in the assignment link available on OWL. You are expected to access and read the instructions prior to commencing the assignment.

#### 5.4 Online Smart Book Assignments:

Students will complete online smart book assignments related to textbook chapter material. Instructions will be provided for each assignment prior to completion on OWL. You are expected to access and read the instructions prior to commencing the assignment.

## 5.5 Online Discussion Board Forum Assignments:

Students will complete online discussion board forum assignments related to various course topics. Instructions will be provided for each assignment prior to completion on OWL. You are expected to access and read the instructions prior to commencing the assignment.

## 5.6 Information Regarding All Assignments:

Students are required to submit all assignments by the due date indicated. Assignments are to be submitted in the manner requested and in the required format. Late assignments will not be accepted unless PRIOR communication has been made with the professor to discuss a verifiable reason (i.e. hospitalization, family funerals, etc.). To be accommodated, students MUST communicate PRIOR to the absence with the Professor (twenty-four hours-notice is expected). Students will be asked to provide documentation to verify these reasons. Students are REQUIRED TO COMPLETE ALL COMPONENTS of this course. There are no exceptions to this. Extra assignments to improve grades will NOT be allowed.

Exams will be scored using the program Scan Exam which examines the answer sheets for unusual coincidences in the pattern of answers given which may be indicative and used as supporting evidence of cheating.

Grades will not be adjusted on the basis of need. It is important to monitor your performance in the course. Remember: You are responsible for your grades in this course. The DAN Department has a grade policy which states that for courses in the 3000 range, the class average must fall between 70% and 77% for all sections of a course taught by the same instructor. In very exceptional circumstances only, class averages outside this range may be approved by the Undergraduate Chair or Chair. Class averages are not grounds for appeal.

### 11. Grade Fairness

Fairness requires that all students be treated equally and be evaluated using the criteria set out in this course outline. The evaluation criteria are based on actual achievement and not on how hard a student has tried. Claims by students of an excellent academic history, good attendance record, need to obtain or maintain a scholarship, desire to be admitted to Ivey or graduate school, or other personal issues, cannot be used to justify a higher grade in the course or a reweighting of course components. There is no extra work or assignments available for extra credit or to "make up" for a course component that was missed or performed poorly.

## 13.2 Make Up Examinations

The student must write a make-up exam if the regularly scheduled exam is missed for reasons for which adequate documentation is received by the instructor (this documentation must be supplied by the Academic Counseling office).

The date and time of the make-up examination will be set by the instructor, who will communicate the date to the student.

If a student is unable to meet the scheduled make-up as agreed, then the student is responsible for obtaining new accommodations from Academic Counselling, and seeking a new make-up date with the instructor within a reasonable time frame.

## 14. University Policy on Cheating and Academic Misconduct

Students are responsible for understanding the nature of and avoiding the occurrence of plagiarism and other academic offenses. Cheating on exams will not be tolerated; students are referred to the university policy on scholastic offenses. Looking at the test of another student, allowing another student to view your exam, or obtaining information about a test in advance are all examples of cheating.

Students found cheating will receive a zero (0%) on that exam. A number of safeguards will be employed to discourage cheating. For example, examination supervisors (proctors) of the tests may ask students to move to another seat during the exam, cover their paper, avert their eyes from other students' papers, remove baseball caps, etc. This is not meant as a personal affront nor as an accusation of cheating, rather as vigilant attempts at proctoring.

The penalties for a student guilty of a scholastic offense include refusal of a passing grade in the assignment, refusal of a passing grade in the course, suspension from the University, and expulsion from the University.

## 15. Procedures For Appealing Academic Evaluations

- 1. In the first instance, all appeals of a grade must be made to the course instructor (informal consultation).
- 2. If the student is not satisfied with the decision of the course instructor, a written appeal must be sent to the Undergraduate Chair: Student Affairs of the Department of Management and Organizational Studies.
- 3. If the response of the Undergraduate Chair is considered unsatisfactory to the student, he/she may then appeal to the Dean of the Faculty in which the course of program was taken.
- 4. Only after receiving a final decision from the Dean may a student appeal to the Senate Review Board Academic. A Guide to Appeals is available from the <u>Office of the Ombudsperson</u>.
