MOS 4497A Section – 200&201 Selected Topics in MOS: Financial Modeling

Course Mode (Blended)

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1. Course Information:

1.1 Class Location and Time:

This course is in blended format. See Brightspace course site for the time and location of in-person and online sessions.

1.2 Course Description:

This course develops essential financial modeling skills with a strong emphasis on practical applications in Microsoft Excel. Students will build, analyze, and interpret models incorporating concepts such as time value of money, security valuation, portfolio analysis, and financial forecasting using the three financial statements. With a hands-on approach, the course bridges theory and practice, preparing students for finance roles that demand strong modeling capabilities.

Prerequisite(s): Enrolment in 4th year BMOS

Technical Requirements

Computer: Students are required to bring their laptop to every in-person class (Section 200 students will have the access to the lab, so bring your own laptop is optional but recommended) and be ready to work with Excel.

Stable internet connection: Students are required to have a working microphone and webcam for the online sessions; UWO licensed Zoom.

3. Course Objectives and Format

The DAN Department of Management and Organizational Studies as a whole draws upon an evidence-based management approach. Evidence-based management is the systematic process of gathering evidence from multiple sources, critically appraising the evidence, and using that evidence in making and evaluating management decisions to improve organizational performance.

3.1 Course objectives

This course prepares students for real-world applications in corporate finance and investment analysis by developing both technical and analytical skills. Students will learn to apply foundational principles of financial modeling, use Microsoft Excel effectively for financial analysis, and present their models clearly to support financial decision-making.

3.2 Course format

This course consists of weekly lectures delivered either in person or online. Lecture sessions will include practice time for students to work on the examples, and they will upload the worksheets to Brightspace after class (by the end of that week). In addition, it is important that students regularly monitor email and OWL communication to stay up to date.

4. Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- Be familiar with Microsoft Excel
- Use Microsoft Excel to perform financial analysis and security valuation
- · Understand the need and the fundamental principles for financial models
- Build revenue, cost, depreciation, working capital, and capital structure schedules to support financial forecasting
- Construct financial models forecasting a firm's future performance based on the three financial statements
- Achieve the badge certified by the Financial Modeling Institute (FMI)

5. Evaluation

Midterm Exam (closed-book, during class time, 2 hours): 30%
Badge of Foundations in Financial Modeling (video tutorials and quizzes provided by FMI): 20%
Final Case Study (individual assignment, open-book, during a specified window): 35%
Homework Assignment (mostly examples during class): 10%
Attendance, Participation, and Professionalism: 5%

Midterm Test:

The midterm test is <u>excel-based</u>, <u>in-person</u>, <u>closed book</u> (no book or notes are allowed during the <u>exam</u>), <u>and facilitated on the ExPrep platform</u>. The exam will be scheduled for 2 hours and conducted in class. Web searching/ ChatGPT or other GenAl tools/Calculators/Translators/Dictionaries are NOT allowed in the midterm exam. Graded exams will not be returned to students but may be reviewed with the instructor in the office hour.

Homework Assignments:

Students are expected to work on an individual excel-based homework assignment after each class. The assignment problems can be in-class examples or additional exercises reflecting the skills taught in that week. There will be 9 homework assignments in total with the highest 8 counted towards your final grade.

FMI Badge

Western University has partnered with the Financial Modeling Institute (FMI) to provide BMOS students access to the FMI's Foundations program as a supplemental learning resource. The FMI Foundations program provides fundamental financial modelling knowledge including theory and concepts and is used in over 100 universities globally in undergraduate and graduate level courses and programs.

In this course, students are expected to complete the FMI Foundations modules which require 15-hour study time including watching video tutorials and writing of a multiple-choice exam. A pass score requires a minimum of 75% score. Multiple attempts are allowed. Successful candidates will receive a digital badge from the Institute. Your professor has arranged this at *no cost* to the student.

The registration link will be provided on the OWL Brightspace course site. The 20% towards the final grade will be composed of the following components: 1) Badge issue date; 2) % of contents viewed; 3) highest score achieved.

Final Case Study

The final project is an individual excel-based case study requiring students to develop a fully integrated five-year financial model based on three years of historical financial statements and specified assumptions. Students must independently construct assumptions and scenarios, schedules for revenue, costs, depreciation, working capital, and capital structure, and link them to the three financial statements. In addition, students should prepare a professional presentation of their work, including a cover page and summary page where appropriate. The project must be completed within the assigned timeframe.

Attendance, Participation, and Professionalism

The full score of attendance, participation, and professionalism is 5 points. Every student starts with a zero score. Attendance is taken each time in class or in the form of participating in-class activities. Every class attendance/participation will be rewarded with 0.5-point until the 5 points is fulfilled. In addition, active participation in class such as engaging in discussions or answering questions will be rewarded with a 0.2-point addition per engagement/question-answering. Meanwhile, any conducts and behaviors that are considered unprofessional will lead to a point deduction of 1 point (e.g. rude emails, impolite calling on the instructor and/or class member, ill manners during the class meetings, etc.).

5.1 General information about missed coursework

All requests for Academic Consideration must be made within 48 hours after the assessment date or submission deadline.

All Academic Consideration requests must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make <u>one</u> Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

- The Final Case Study which must be completed within the assigned period.
- The Midterm Exam (Designated by the instructor as the <u>one</u> assessment that always requires
 documentation when requesting Academic Consideration) for which a makeup exam date is provided
 below.

When a student <u>mistakenly</u> submits their <u>one</u> allowed Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** for the assessments listed above or those in the **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility** section below, <u>the request cannot be recalled and reapplied</u>. This privilege is forfeited.

5.2 Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments

Makeup Midterm Test:

Midterm exam is <u>one</u> assessment that always requires documentation when requesting Academic Consideration. Students who miss the midterm test approval <u>by Academic Counselling</u> will have two options: 1) Students who miss the midterm test with legitimate reasons (<u>with documentation approved by Academic consideration</u>) may take the makeup midterm test on <u>November 28th (Friday), 1:00pm-3:00pm</u>. 2) Students who miss the scheduled makeup midterm test with legitimate reasons (<u>with documentation approved by Academic consideration</u>) can have the midterm grade reweighed: 10% towards the final case study; 10% towards the FMI modules; 10% towards the Homework Assignments.

Extenuating circumstances for Final Case Study

Students who are unable to submit the final case study within the specified timeframe (including No-Late-Penalty Period) will be granted extended due date with the <u>Approval by Academic Counselling</u>. If the students cannot complete the case study within the extended period, they need to apply for <u>a second academic consideration</u> and will be granted a second extension. However, the **CUTOFF DATE** for the case study is **December 22, 2025**, after which the assessment will no longer be accepted. Students who cannot complete the final case study due to long-term illness should contact the instructor for further arrangements.

Essential Learning Requirements

Even when Academic Considerations are granted for missed coursework, the following are deemed essential to earn a passing grade.

• a passing grade of 50% on the final Case Study to ensure that students demonstrate sufficient mastery of learning outcomes.

Students who do not meet the above requirement will receive a grade of 45 (or lower).

Coursework with Assessment Flexibility

By policy, instructors may deny Academic Consideration requests for the following assessments with built-in flexibility:

Flexible Completion

Homework Assignments. This course has 9 homework (HW) assignments, and the 8 HWs with the highest marks are counted towards your final grade. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students <u>do not</u> need to request Academic Consideration for the first missed HWs. Academic consideration requests will be denied for the first missed HW. Academic Consideration requests may be granted when students miss more than 1 HWs, and these additional (2nd, 3rd...) missed HWs will be granted with extended due dates.

Final Case Study. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students <u>do not</u> need to request Academic Consideration, and they are permitted to submit their case study up to 48 hours past the deadline without a late penalty. Should students submit their case study beyond 48 hours past the deadline, a late penalty of <u>5% out of the total component grade of 35% per day</u> will be applied. Academic Consideration requests may be granted only for extenuating circumstances that <u>started before</u> the deadline and <u>lasted longer</u> than the No-Late-Penalty Period (48 hours).

Grades will not be adjusted on the basis of need. It is important to monitor your performance in the course. Remember: You are responsible for your grades in this course.

The DAN Department has a grade policy which states that for courses in the 3000-4000 range, the class average must fall between 70% and 77% for all sections of a course taught by the same instructor. In very exceptional circumstances only, class averages outside this range may be approved by the Undergraduate Chair or Chair. Class averages are not grounds for appeal.

10. Attendance

IN-PERSON: It is expected that students will attend all classes. The instructor does not provide access to lecture notes. Students are encouraged to obtain missed lecture notes from a fellow student.

If you miss a class due to minor illness or other problems, check your course outline for information regarding attendance requirements and make sure you are not missing a test or exam. Cover any readings and arrange to borrow the missed lectures notes from a classmate.

10.2 Extended Absences.

If you are absent more than approximately two weeks or if you get too far behind to catch up, you should consider reducing your workload by dropping one or more courses. 11. Grade Fairness

Fairness requires that all students be treated equally and be evaluated using the criteria set out in this course outline. The evaluation criteria are based on actual achievement and not on how hard a student has tried.

Claims by students of an excellent academic history, good attendance record, need to obtain or maintain a scholarship, desire to be admitted to lvey or graduate school, or other personal issues, cannot be used to justify a higher grade in the course or a reweighting of course components. There is no extra work or assignments available for extra credit or to "make up" for a course component that was missed or performed poorly.

You, the student, are responsible for the grades earned.

12. Posting of Grades

Midterm exam grades will be posted on OWL once the grades are available. Final exam grades and final course grades are not posted on OWL and are available once they have been posted by the Registrar under "Academic Summary" at the <u>Student Centre</u> website.

13.1 Illness

Essays, written assignments and/or lab reports should reflect the student's own thoughts and independent written work. Students should also generate their own figures (e.g., graphs, diagrams) rather than using AI generated ones. By adhering to these guidelines, students contribute to a responsible and effective learning environment that promotes critical thinking, independent inquiry and all them to produce original written contributions with integrity. The same principles also apply to the use of translation software to support the writing the essays and other written assessments. When used, any such AI or translation tool should be used ethically and responsibly, and students must cite or credit the tools used in line with the expectation to use AI as a tool to learn, not only to produce content.

Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be Course Outlines subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

ExPrep monitors all file submissions. If you submit someone else's work, the software flags it as a possible integrity violation. Both parties are identified even if they are in different sections, courses, or schools. In such a case, both parties will receive a grade of zero. "Borrowing a friend's computer" and accidently submitting your friend's project instead of your own is not an

excuse. You and your friend will both receive grades of zero. Leaving a file available for others to access, even inadvertently, can result in a zero for the project. You must both download the file individually and complete it individually. For this reason, do not use shared computers under the same account.

Cheating on exams will not be tolerated; students are referred to the university policy on scholastic offenses. Looking at the test of another student, allowing another student to view your exam, or obtaining information about a test in advance are all examples of cheating. A number of safeguards will be employed to discourage cheating. For example, examination supervisors (proctors) of the tests may ask students to move to another seat during the exam, cover their paper, avert their eyes from other students' papers, remove baseball caps, etc. This is not meant as a personal affront nor as an accusation of cheating, rather as vigilant attempts at proctoring.

The penalties for a student guilty of a scholastic offense may include a zero grade on the assessment, refusal of a passing grade in the assignment, refusal of a passing grade in the course, suspension from the University, and expulsion from the University.

15. Procedures For Appealing Academic Evaluations

- 1. In the first instance, all appeals of a grade must be made to the course instructor (informal consultation).

- 3. If the response of the Undergraduate Chair is considered unsatisfactory to the student, they may then appeal to the Associate Dean, Undergraduate of the Faculty in which the course of program was taken.
